

The Eastern Sierra glaciers that feed the streams carrying water south through major agricultural areas all the way to Los Angeles are shrinking. An image of a dry creek bed is collaged and stitched in the foreground. The stitching is a metaphor for the mending and rebuilding we must do to make our world whole again. debraachen.com


Journey into Serenity: The Essence of Tea Rituals Ginger Chih Archival Pigment Print \$650


Hope Whispers That The Tide Always Returns

Reine Rorbuer, Lofoten Islands, Norway







Playground 'Parque', Old Havana, Cuba Kenneth Parker Archival Pigment Ink Print \$2200






Sitting For A Portrait
